FROM THE PASTOR...

After worship one Sunday this month, I mentioned to someone who was shaking my hand on their way out the door about an upcoming event. They looked interested and asked, "Is that information on the website?" I wasn't sure, even though the event takes place each year. As I write this article, I don't even remember correctly which event it was. It involved something like Advent evening devotionals (Tuesdays at 5 p.m.) or perhaps decorating the church for Christmas (Saturday, December 1, 1:00 to 3:00 p.m.). Whatever it was, it was standard for the life of a congregation during this time of year. But it reminded me of the complexities of communication in the digital age, and how we fill our lives with being busy.

For me, social media and use of the internet is still a second language and not my "go to" response in sharing about life. It's a new way of thinking when a traditional church event needs mentioned beyond a paper newsletter or bulletin announcement to also include a listing on the church website as an Event, along with the church Facebook page as a Post for an upcoming event. Social media adds steps to the planning process, but also helps get the word out, and are places people look if they have questions. These "platforms" also help highlight the life of the church, like the video of the bell choir that is mentioned in this newsletter. The video is on You Tube, but it's shown on Facebook, which also allows comments and sharing with others, and the conversation takes on a life of its own.

The other morning I turned on the computer and started looking online at some pages. Before I knew it, an hour had zipped by!

Screen time has a way of consuming the clock. All these social media outlets and the digital age of our culture, although they add so much, they can also add to stresses of already busy lives.

This highlights the importance of traditional aspects of the life of a congregation: meeting people face to face, having conversations over refreshments, worshipping together and participating as we are gifted to share, gathering for special events such as decorating and devotions. The only time I sing in public is during a worship setting. Yet singing is an amazing way of sharing with others and participating in life. Intentionally taking time to slow down helps us focus on the main reason of the Christmas message: God's love as a gift to us in Christ, as Jesus is born.

So as far as I can tell, the Advent Devotionals are listed as events through various outlets. They are on Tuesday evenings, December 4, 11, and 18, from 5:00 p.m. to 5:25 p.m. and they are intentional times to quiet our hearts from the rush of the holidays. Reflection, silence, scripture, and song, balanced in a gentle mix to help keep us centered not in virtual reality, but in the Ground of Being. We are invited on an inward journey, otherwise our lives will simply be stressful, frantic, and tiring. The gift of Christmas is for peace beyond understanding. Reduce the distractions and enter in.

CREATIVE WRITING

Following many years of exploring his calling into ministry, and more recently attending a Creative Writing Retreat at St. Gertrude's Monastery and participating in an ongoing Pastor's Learning Community Cohort through the Inland Northwest Presbytery, Pastor Andy is writing more.

Recognizing that much of Pastor Andy's work and calling in ministry involves writing, the Personnel Committee recommended to the Session that more time be allocated to writing, beyond the usual preparation for sermons. This will allow other types of writing which will also reach a larger audience than Sunday morning gatherings. The Session has authorized up to 10 hours a week to allow Pastor Andy to focus on writing and the inspiration behind it.

Earth Care Postscripts

After reading Margaret Ann's thoughtful article about holiday environmental concerns, I became more observant about related topics in the news and advertisements. For instance, much giftwrapping paper can be recycled, if it has no metallic trim. (Most ribbons & bows cannot be recycled.) Lego company is making an effort to "go green", although it seems painfully slow to me. The Lego pieces that depict trees and plants are made from plant-based, not petroleum-based, plastic. By 2030 they plan to use sustainable sources for all of their products and packaging. **

If you like to give coffee as a gift, or stock up for home use, you may wish to consider a coffee club approach with the Arbor Day Foundation* for shade-grown, sustainably grown coffee, with the bonus of tree plantings and water management. Also, your Earth Care Team is considering participation in the "Presbyterian Coffee Program" to purchase fair trade, organic coffee that supports organic farming, composting, and shade growing techniques. This program also includes a bonus: a percentage of the funds go to the Presbyterian Hunger Program.

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AND BONNER COUNTY HUMAN RIGHTS TASK FORCE RECONNECTING

The First Presbyterian Church and Bonner County Human Rights Task Force (BCHRTF) are reconnecting this year, 26 years after the organization began in 1992, with its first president, The Rev. Mary Robinson Mohr, pastor of our church. The Task Force was organized as a faith based idea, and many of its first meetings were in our church basement meeting room. Gary Payton, active in First Presbyterian Church, later was BCHRTF president.

At that time our choir had an exchange with an African American church in Spokane, with our choir singing at the Spokane church, and the Spokane choir singing here at First Presbyterian.

"BCHRTF is excited to think of the many future events that could once more bring us together—in support of a peaceful community where all are welcome, in which every individual can live without fear or intimidation, and in which everyone's contribution is valued, respected and encouraged," Brenda Hammond, current president stated.

Our church is already busy working for a peaceful, welcoming community. We had a performance in October by the World Relief Neema Children's Choir; in November were Peace Pole celebrations on World Community Day, first to dedicate a Peace Pole at the Bonner County Library, and then a celebration at our own church. These were community events, and the community turned out.

We will be connecting with BCHRTF in an ongoing basis, and working with them to promote peace wherever possible, in a welcoming, respectful community. Look for future activities involving both groups.

The canvas ones were used outside in the glorious sunny day and the plastic one was used indoors, inside the circle of participants. There were seventeen participants plus the two presenters, Jolie and Robbin McCrum. Feed-back was overwhelmingly positive and it was fantastic to bring in such an accomplished facilitator to share her experience of walking labyrinths. The energy and enthusiasm to move forward with a labyrinth in the Community Peace Garden was high. The photo of the canvas labyrinth shows it placed about where the permanent one will be installed.

Friday, November 2nd was World Community Day. At noon, we hosted a community peacemaking event around the peace pole we called, Pause for Peace. The program was about 25 minutes and included prayers, poems, and songs. It was a wonderful way to share the Community Peace Garden and new gazebo donated by the Sandpoint Rotary Club. We served hot drinks under the gazebo and it was wonderful to greet the 40-45 folks who braved the chill for a hot mug and a shared celebration of community.


Hosting community events simply could not be done without the unwavering help from FPC members and friends. Please accept our heartfelt gratitude for your continued support.

The Christmas decoration sale has been postponed until 2019. When taking down personal Christmas decorations, PW asks congregation members to sort and donate unwanted items to PW. Storage of decorations will be in the church basement where rummage sale items were held.

Members brought various food items for the Magnolia House Thanksgiving. Since residents all had holiday plans, the food items were donated to the Food Bank via Sylvia Humes. A Thanksgiving card was signed by members and delivered to the Magnolia House as a gesture of friendship.

Due to a mix up – the speaker did not show for the Lilly Brook House program. However, Pastor Andy saved the day with a report from their website. The Lilly Brooke House addresses victims of Domestic violence, children through adult. All investigative work is done at the house rather than going to each department throughout the city. Children can play in a room until their time to go to court next door. A medical exam room is in the building permitting exam and treatment. This is a local expression of a national program.

The next meeting will be the Christmas potluck and carol sing-a-long December 11th. At that time decisions on together-in-service mission will be made.

Here is a glimpse at the last 16 hours in part of the life of the church...

After Tuesday's choir practice Sue Helander, Judy Labrie, and Mary Sturgis started creating the garland used to decorate the sanctuary for Christmas. When looking for the rope we used last year, we searched all over and couldn't find it, so one of them went and bought a new rope. In the meantime, I discovered during the search that the basement sump pump had failed, yet the water had not yet flooded. Standing in the church basement with a broken sump pump, I called Chuck Bauer, since he is familiar with this system. He asked if it would wait until morning, and it seemed like it would. The next morning, we both show up and it was about the same status. Not quite flooded, but the pump was broken. We removed the old pump, then he went and found a new pump, only better. He brought it to the church. It needed a part to connect it to the outflow pipe, so he went to the hardware store to find an adapter part and a hose piece. I got busy in the office and lost track of the process, so I went downstairs and by then Chuck had come and gone, the pump was in, and just as I stood there admiring his work it clicked on, sucked the water out, and it all is working great!

Thanks, Chuck Bauer for your behind the scenes work! You're FABULOUS! Thanks also to everyone who shared their joyful fellowship and service, like putting greenery together and decorating. The church is a people, and the people do the ministry. From ushers to elders, we are a community and YOU are appreciated and loved.


