From the Pastor...

Do you have time to read this? It takes time to focus on things, and in the time it takes to read this, many other things could have been done. Time seems limited in that sense, that in choosing one thing, other things are negated by default. If you look up from these words, I bet you would find several other things you could probably do at this given moment. Yet if you are reading this sentence, it means they have been deferred and your focus is on reading, right now.

Attention interacts with each moment. Our focus is either sharp or dim, direct or distracted, intent or diffused. At times, certain projects require more attention, while at other times we can relax a bit. Sometimes, multiple projects or events require attention and focus, overlapping in ways that compound complications, and we can feel stress, and if someone asks us how we're doing, we answer, "Busy!" Some see this as a good thing, and our culture certainly puts value into productivity, opportunities capitalized upon, and objectives successfully achieved. You've likely heard that saying, "Time is money." David Walburn, a singer song writer from northwest Montana, even has a line in one of his songs about "trading time for money." Other social commentators talk about the "wageslave" class, living perpetually in a debt-pay cycle.

James Finley, a spiritual teacher with experience as a psychotherapist, talks about the attention and focus we are invited to receive from God. God loves us, and reaches out into our hearts, enjoying the process of loving us. But Finley also reminds us that at the same time, we are invited to love God, to give God our full attention and focus, to meet God in the moment, releasing distractions. God enjoys receiving our attention, just as we enjoy blessing

as God focuses on us. Sometimes we experience this relational dynamic in community, such as in prayer groups or worship. But we are also called to the spiritual discipline of solitude, of being in and sharing God's Presence.

Richard Rohr speaks of this time with God, saying, "In solitude, at last, we're able to let God define us the way we are always supposed to be defined – by relationship: the

I-thou relationship, in relation to a Presence that demands nothing of us but presence itself. Not performance but presence."

Spending time with God, allowing love to flow in the moment, is at the root, or core, of all other moments and actions. Like footings below a foundation, God's love is the support which defines the structure of our lives, our church, our society, and the world. But like the footings holding the new steps at the church entry, it involves digging deep to find a level space.

Inner, spiritual work can be challenging, and digging deep to find a level space can be hard. But nothing is of more more value than Presence.

I hope this newsletter encourages you to see through the life of this congregation, the decisions of the Session, and the activities of the membership, the life of the Spirit undergirding and leading the church in Christlike ways of love, justice, and peace as we follow Jesus.

SOUPER BOWL OF CARING RESULTS REVEALED

The results have been tabulated, and this year was a winner! Our church, combined with youth groups, other churches, schools, local businesses, grocery stores, and support from NFL teams, helped generate over \$9.6 million in cash and food items. 100% of all donations go directly to each group's designated charity of choice.

Our contribution raised on Souper Bowl Sunday was \$242.00 and 48 pounds of food, which was delivered to the Bonner County Food Bank. As a small church, we make a big difference!

Box Tops for Education (Bright pink. Look for them on food products)Each is worth 10 cents and is a help to local schools. Because they have expiration dates, please don't hold onto them. Leave them in the decorated box on the table in front of the Church Office.

Plastic grocery and produce bags and egg cartons

These

are used by the Food Bank. Leave them on pew in Alder Street foyer.

Used computers, keyboards, flat screen monitors, mouse, and printersThe all-volunteer North Idaho Computer Users Group in Coeur d'Alene refurbishes these before donating or selling at an affordable price to the disadvantaged. Leave them in Office or call Anna Bates (208-263-8126) for pick up.

Used cell phones, chargers, manuals, cases, and accessories

HopeLine

from Verizon refurbishes these before donating to domestic violence victims. Please include the phone's telephone number (so I can delete your personal information). Leave them in Office or give to Anna Bates.

Pop Tops for Ronald McDonald House Charity

This

is a national fundraiser. The tabs from cans are a high-grade aluminum which command a good price, and the proceeds are used to purchase linens. Leave them in basket on table in front of the Office.

Food for Bonner County Food Bank

Leave them in blue bag on pew in Alder Street foyer or in basket by the front entrance.

Sweet Magnolia This

is the women's residential addiction recovery program located kitty-corner from the church. They have asked for toilet paper and paper towels, but they sincerely appreciate whatever you can donate. Leave them in box on pew in Alder Street fover.

Used Bibles

We are a collection site for the Bible Foundation in Oregon, which distributes Bibles nationally and globally. The Foundation gladly accepts damaged Bibles, because the need is so great. Leave them in box on pew in Alder Street foyer.

Used eyeglasses, sunglasses and cases

These are used by volunteer doctors and others on annual medical missions to El Salvador. Leave them in Office or give to Anna Bates.

Living Waters for the World

This is the one mission project that requires a monetary donation. Volunteers have gone to over 30 countries to install clean water systems to replace existing polluted water sources. ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING

During April, Lynn and I had the opportunity to visit the country of Nepal for a visit with family who came from Myanmar. Before this trip, I had asked the Presbyterian Church (USA) office in Louisville, KY about efforts being done in that country through the One Great Hour of Sharing program, which we just finished collecting funding from our church for 2019. I learned that some of the funds collected were being used in Nepal for recovery from a 2015earthquake. Although our visit was not right at the center of where the earthquake occurred, we did see damage done to some buildings that had been affected by the quake. We also learned that closer to the center of the quake, there was considerable damage done to the water systems in the village and farm areas. We heard that they had gotten help to get water pumped out of the nearby Himalayan mountains to replace the damaged water systems.

Nepal is a very poor country which is struggling to make improvements in various ways. Dealing with an earthquake besides those efforts for improvements is not easy. It was gratifying to know that money given through our One Great Hour of Sharing program is helping countries like Nepal around the world.

OUR EARTH CARE TEAM HAS BEEN BUSY

As winter SLOWLY made a transition into spring, our Earth Care Team geared up with new knowledge and new actions. We chose six environmental organizations that are active locally, learned about them through interviews and reading, and summarized that information for the congregation. We learned about Citizens' Climate Lobby, Lake Pend Oreille Waterkeeper, 350 Sandpoint, Idaho Conservation League, Rock Creek Alliance, and Citizens Against Newport Silicon Smelter. Although all of these groups have agendas of local concern and of interest to Earth Care goals, we chose to focus current advocacy efforts on Citizens Climate Lobby (CCL) and Lake Pend Oreille Waterkeeper. We requested and received Session approval to proceed with specific advocacy efforts promoted by these two groups. As suggested by CCL and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA), several of us have written to Representatives in Congress about legislation for "Carbon Fee and Dividend"; we will follow up with information to the congregation as this legislation progresses. We joined with Waterkeeper members and many others to testify at hearings in March about a proposal for additional local railroad bridges. Our focus was to request a thorough Environmental Impact Statement on the plans, prior to construction.

Our latest outreach was definitely more FUN than letter writing and hearing testimony. We had a display at the Earth Day celebration on Saturday, April 20. Pastor Andy, Jane Fritz, Kathleen Huntley, and I had opportunities to show and explain pollinators and the plants they relate to, about using natural substances instead of complex chemicals for cleaning tasks, and about alternatives to plastics for food storage. Lynn Pietz had arranged for an attractive card-sized handout; we probably distributed at least 100 of those. We found the 400 to 500 adults and kids in attendance responsive to our topics.


STAIRWAY TO HEAVEN UPDATE

The Stairway to Heaven, front entry project, continues to take shape, step by step. The old structure was removed, which revealed that at some point in the history a patch job had already been applied. The rebar was rusting from inside, and there were no footings. The new structure began by digging for footings, which support the newly poured steps and landing. An inset "frame" was designed for inserting a finger labyrinth on the north side of the landing. The concrete supports for the timber frame posts are the most recent addition. Todd Vorhies, as General Contractor, and Reid Weber with Boden Architecture have been very good to work with on this project. One change order has been approved, adding \$3,000 to the original \$50,000 so the corner portion of the sidewalk can be adjusted to comply with ADA guidelines. We were exempt from this but chose this action for the best long term benefit. Things seem to be going well. Contributions are nearing our goal. Thank you for your generous support of this project!
