From the Pastor...

The Easter cycles has concluded, at least on the calendar. The liturgical year includes various seasons. Easter season celebrates Resurrection faith. Ascension Day, 40 days after Easter, remembers the risen Christ departing from the disciples, leaving the promise of the coming Spirit. The Holy Spirit arrived on Pentecost. We traditionally wear red that Sunday to symbolize the flames as tongues of fire rested on the apostles. Trinity Sunday is the following week, this year that is May 30th, and honors the relational aspect of God as three-in-one, one God in three persons, Father, Son, and the Holy Spirit.

We now enter "Ordinary Time," which doesn't sound very dramatic. It sounds...ordinary, plain, non-descript. It is the dominant season of the church year, interrupted by winter's Advent Season and spring's Lent, and Easter. Ordinary Time's liturgical color is green, symbolizing the growth of faith. This is ironic, because growth doesn't tend to happen when we're comfortable, when things are "ordinary." If comfort is what we seek, we will likely stay static in terms of growth. Maybe this works for us. Many people live their entire lives with a static notion of faith. But deep learning, growing, change; these happen outside of our comfort zone. It takes some stressors to get our attention.

On Sunday, June 6 we switch to worship at 9:30 a.m. for the summer schedule. Ordinarily, summer has a different feel to it, a flow unlike the programmatic months of the fall, winter, and spring. In this area

people like to get outside in the summer and go to the lake, welcome company who come to visit, or take vacations. Summer calendars fill up and before you know it, fall is here because the weeks fly by.

I hope your summer is enjoyable and you find comfort in your life. But I also hope Resurrection Faith is more than a calendar thing, and you grow, learn, and deepen in the ways of faith as we follow Christ. No matter what the season, may God be glorified!

THE SESSION SUMMARY MAY 2021

Session met on April 20, 2021, using a hybrid virtual/in-person format. While most gathered social-distancing in Fellowship Hall, a couple elders joined via Zoom conferencing. This arrangement allowed Don Deters to attend the meeting while enjoying the Bavarian-themed village of Leavenworth, Washington.

We welcomed the Rev. Steve Neuder to the meeting. He recently began serving as the Presbytery's Committee on Ministry liaison to our church. Steve will moderate our September session meeting while Pastor Andy is on vacation.

Recognizing the hybrid trend of in-person/virtual Sunday worship services, Session approved purchasing equipment to enhance live-streaming of our services. While not cheap at just under \$8,000, Presbytery offers grants to assist churches with this type of upgrade. We will use the Memorial Fund to cover the remaining costs.

Thanks to finance elder Paula Vincent's efforts, we once again received a 2021 loan/grant from the Payroll Protection Funds program. Last year's grant of approximately \$9,000 offset revenue losses from loose offering, facility rental and retreats – all a direct result of pandemic restrictions.

During our monthly review of the current COVID-19 health protocols, Session agreed to reopen our facilities to outside groups. We will require them to disinfect tables and other surfaces and encourage social distancing and masks. These groups seldom interact with other church activities so there will be minimal contact with our members.

Several of these groups have been using our building for many years as they quietly and efficiently serve the community with their mission. Those who benefit from these groups have suffered from a lack of companionship and support for well over a year during this time of pandemic restrictions. We welcome them back to the sanctuary of our facility.

Dave Pietz announced that the Bike and Build tour has been cancelled for the second straight year. We regret not hosting these cyclists who advocate for affordable housing as they pedal across America.

Don't forget to wear red for Pentecost Sunday on May 23; whether you join us in person or remotely.

STEWARDSHIP AND FINANCE

Susie Haskins has been working hard behind the scenes to transfer individual giving records for FPC members and friends to a new software program. The prior version could no longer be updated. Thanks to her diligent work, a mid-year report of your financial gifts to the church will be available this month.

Collectively, our combined giving through May 23rd totals \$66,544. This represents 45% of the \$147,000 budget. Expenses are averaging about \$12,000 per month and are anticipated to be near \$63,000 or 43% of the budget through the end of May.

We are so proud of our new Community Gardens at First Presbyterian Church! If you haven't seen them, they are raised beds to the south of the building, and under the maple tree nearby. The garden frames were built at the Bonner County Youth Detention Center under the guidance of Ken, who directs a "shop" program for juveniles. After delivery of a truckload of organic soil on Thursday, April 15, we "raked, hoed, and shoveled" that good, rich soil into the gardens. Then it was ready for our April 18 Earth Day dedication. Vegetables will be donated to the Bonner County Food Bank.

Through out this whole process, we have been eternally grateful to Michelle Murphree and Dion Heller for their work and support every step of the way. Michele and Dion have spearheaded the beginnings of Community Gardens all over Sandpoint and in some outlying areas, to benefit The Food Bank. They walked us through the purchase of lumber, and had a pickup ready to deliver it to be built into garden frames. They then delivered the frames to the church on that Thursday, with church members waiting to fill them with soil. They attended our Earth Day dedication, along with Ken and the young man who built the frames, and Debbie Love, Food Bank Director. It was a mission of love all the way!

Now we're getting in gear to plant the gardens when the watering system is installed, probably the first week in June. We'll have plant starts from Diane Green of "Greentree Naturals Organic Gardens," tomato and marigold starts from Kathleen Huntley, and seeds. Please contact one of us.
