# UPDATE ON ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING (OGHS)

Our congregation collected \$1,753 for the OGHS offering. Of that total, \$625 was designated for direct Ukraine Relief by our church members and the remaining \$1,128 was designated for OGHS overall, which supports three programs: Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People. Currently, much of the funds for Disaster Assistance goes to Ukraine Relief.

## Greetings,

In reviewing our first quarter financial information, you will note that revenue and expenses are meeting budget expectations. Preliminary information from April indicates we may finish the month with about \$1,000 less revenue this month than budgeted, but overall the first four months are keeping us on track with the budget.

Included in our reported revenue are additional gifts of \$1759 dollars to offset the \$2775 per capita expense that is paid for the support of the Presbytery. We encourage each member to help offset this expense through a contribution of \$37.00 per person (add per capita designation on your check or offering envelope).

Your generosity continues to be expressed in so many ways, including the recent One Great Hour of Sharing offering that collected over \$1700 to support the OGHS missions.

### VISION & MINISTRY TASK FORCE

Did you know Pastor Andy is our part-time pastor? The hours were trimmed to a 30-hour week at the beginning of the year. As a result of the world-wide and local trend of declining church membership and attendance, hundreds of churches are employing part-time staff.

As a result of that, the ruling elders on Session appointed the Vision & Ministry Task Force. Members are Pastor Andy, Bill Love, Cynthia Dalsing, Judy McComish, Paula Vincent, Dyno Wahl, and Judy Labrie. There have been four hour-long meetings to date with the goal of presenting recommendations to Session for the May meeting.

The context and purpose for the Task Force has been to lead an exploration into an updated vision of ministry and mission of this congregation and recommend how to structure staffing and leadership to implement this vision. A small church has different dynamics than a large congregation. While the financial picture is stable at the moment, ongoing trends in active membership and worship attendance suggest a dynamic, proactive approach.

The Task Force has been reviewing the book, *Part Time is Plenty, Thriving without Full-Time Clergy,* by G. Jeffrey MacDonald which has been very helpful in recognizing that churches with part-time pastors prosper and flourish, particularly when church leaders are curious, flexible and willing to try new ways of being church.

More will be revealed as the Task Force continues to meet, ponder and explore. Please keep this group, the church leadership, and our congregation's vision in your thoughts and prayers for the best, most wonderful outcome for all.



# Celebrating Sabbath

# Accepting God's Gift of Rest and Delight by Carol M. Bechtel With Suggestions for Leaders by Laura Mariko Cheifetz

In the nine lessons of this Bible study—with passages from Genesis, Exodus, Deuteronomy, Isaiah, Matthew, Luke, and Acts—we'll consider Sabbath

- as a celebration, not a day of dreary formality
- as God's intent for all of creation and that includes busy women too
- as one day of the week, perhaps a Sunday
- as a time to surrender unhealthy striving and frantic busyness, and instead trust God will provide
- as a reminder that life is precious and working too much is against God's plans for our precious lives
- as a day devoted to community and justice and not exclusively to self-care

Ultimately, Sabbath reminds us to honor God who honors us by giving us a day each week to reset our pace, our priorities, and our lives. See page 4

The theme for the July/August 2016 issue of Horizon's magazine was "Sabbath: Rest and Restoration". Carole Bechtold and DeeDee Risher wrote articles for the magazine ....here are samples. The full articles can be found in the magazine.

"Sabbath."

The word sounds like something from another century. To the extent that we hear the word at all any more, it's used as an old-fashioned way of referring to Sunday—the "Sabbath Day." Unless, of course, we have Jewish friends or live in close proximity to Jewish communities—in which case we may overhear an occasional "Shabbat Shalom" ("Sabbath peace") greeting on the way to the parking lot after work on a Friday afternoon. Or, if you're like me, you may have found yourself puzzling over the "Sabbath" setting on your new stove. In all of these instances, Sabbath may strike us as something strange or old-fashioned—something that doesn't have much to do with us as contemporary Christians.

Worse, many people have negative associations with Sabbath. For them, it conjures up unhappy memories of rigid rules and endless hours stuck inside as a child—forbidden to play or make any noise. One woman told of how she first met her neighbor. On the woman's first Sunday in her new house, she had put some clothes in the dryer. The next thing she knew there was a knock on the door. Her neighbor had come across the street to say that she'd noticed the steam coming out of the dryer vent and wondered whether the newcomer had forgotten that it was the Sabbath Day.

Hopefully, stories like these are becoming a thing of the past. But just because Sabbath sounds like something from another century doesn't mean it is a concept for another century. Rather, I believe, we should recover God's invitation to Sabbath for our own time (Carole Bechtold)

When I was growing up in South Carolina, Sundays were all about church. While my mother insisted on baths almost every night of the week, Saturday night marked our most vigorous ablutions. While my sisters and I lined up for Mom to curl our hair Saturday night, wrapping the thin ends of our locks in toilet paper and fixing them to our heads with bobby pins, we were allowed to watch television, a rare treat in my household. We each had a Sunday dress and shoes used only for church.

My mother never cooked on Sunday. It was the only day of the week that I remember her staying in bed most of the afternoon, reading. She had the odd perk of managing a dining hall at my father's residential school. So we got a tray of food from the dining hall and ate leftovers for supper. Sometimes on Sunday nights she would lead us in small lessons on the Bible.

"Remember the Sabbath, and keep it holy" whispers the fourth commandment (Exodus 20). For my family, Sabbath was as much about church attendance as about rest and a break from worldly things. Little did I realize then that this observance of Sabbath was quickly growing anachronistic and, in the course of the next 30 years, would largely be lost. (DeeDee Risher)
