There are some major items on the calendar in the next couple of months. One is an election with a focus on local, state, and national life, with ripple effects into the international realm. As things seem to go these days, it will likely be weeks to months of contested instability and varying levels of conflict over election results. People I've spoken with seem tense, stressed, and nervous. But another event helps us remember that we have much to be thankful for. Thanksgiving. A holiday at the end of November, the most travelled one in the United States as families and friends come together to feast. Then there is Christmas. Weeks of preparation, anticipation, and waiting come to an end as we celebrate the birth of Jesus. This religious holiday overlaps into the culture with other stories that mix in, such as reindeer, gift exchange, and stockings hung on a chimney that Santa comes down sometime Christmas Eve night. From ballot boxes to turkey dinners to candles and singing Silent Night, these all take place within less than two months.


In this mix, it may be helpful to lean into spiritual disciplines even more over these next weeks. Quiet prayer that experientially calms our heart, mind, and spirit to claim our center in divine Presence may not extinguish anxieties or stresses, but reminds us that there is more going on at deeper levels that can be trusted. Walking prayer helps our body get in on it as we feel with each step an inner experience that has a grounding effect. No wonder scriptures share images, like Jesus inviting people to follow on "the way," or about springs of living water, both involving movement. Springs bubble up from the unseen, they are not stagnant but provide fresh, potable water that gives life basic sustenance and allows things to flourish. Sometimes springs are small and quiet, other times they have quite the flow, even a current that bubbles up.

On Saturday, December 14, I'll offer an Advent Journey Labyrinth Workshop from 10 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. to introduce this unique tool of prayer and provide a shared group experience. There will be a sign up in advance.

As we navigate the calendar's events with their mix of challenge and opportunity, we're reminded of what James Finley says about God's love. God's love protects us from nothing, but sustains us in all things.

Growing up, my siblings and I each had chores that were our responsibility. At an early age these chores were as simple as setting the dinner table, feeding the family pet, gathering and sorting the laundry, etc. While we didn't have a weekly allowance, we were gifted with a dime each week that we could put in the Sunday School offering to support a mission that we had selected as a Sunday School group.

When we were a little bit older and received monetary gifts or had part-time jobs, we were taught to set aside one tenth of each gift or paycheck as a tithe, one tenth to take to the bank and deposit into our savings account (remember those fun little paper passbooks?) and the remainder going into our checking accounts. These simple strategies were our parents' way of teaching us about stewardship. In reflection, these childhood gifts to the church weren't very large in terms of monetary value; however, being able to participate and give back as part of a community of faith brought joy then even as it does now.

Highlights from 2024

- Provided financial support through mission giving and participation in special offerings including One Great Hour of Sharing, Peace and Global Witness and Christmas Joy
- FPC meets the per capita request of \$39 per member to support our connectional church with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) General Assembly, Synod, and Presbytery in addition to missional gifts to General Assembly and Presbytery
- Pastor Andy's sermon is posted weekly on the church website and on Andy's Substack profile; the Live Stream video is on You Tube
- Providing Fellowship Hall space and use of the kitchen in partnership with the Wednesday Soup Kitchen which regularly provides a hot meal for 25-30 individuals
- Meeting space is offered for community use and local chapters of AA, Al Anon, and TOPS
- FPC partners with the Bonner County Human Rights Task Force by providing and supporting space for retreats, training and community gatherings
- The sanctuary is frequently used by many of the local music schools and groups for recitals and community concerts
- FPC also hosted a concert for the community that was provided by the Wesley Bell Ringers, a music ministry of Christ United Methodist Church in Salt Lake City; additionally, congregants provided dinner, lodging and breakfast for the youth ringers and sponsors
- The gift of space in the Peace Garden, including a "Little Free Library" gets frequent visitors
- Over 3000 pounds of food were contributed to the Bonner Food Bank during November and December 2023 through the cooperative efforts of the FPC and UMC congregations
- Congregation members volunteer in many ways at Sandpoint Senior Center serving as meal delivery drivers, food service helpers, and helping with special/fundraising events
- Financial donations and FPC volunteers support the Bonner Community Food Bank and Bonner Homeless Transitions
- The congregation hosts benefits, e.g., the St Patrick's Day dinner to support the Senior Center

FPC sponsored a stretch of Highway 95 through semi-annual clean up drives

Session Notes for October

The Session met for its regular monthly meeting on October 16, 2024. Present were Moderator, Pastor Andy, Clerk, Kirsten Thompson, and Elders, Sharon Anderson, Sue Helander, Judy McComish, Judy Labrie, Mary Sturgis, and Paula Vincent. Sylvia Humes was excused.

The Session approved its Consent Agenda including approval of several events at the church. New member, Nova Dodd was welcome by Reaffirmation of Faith, the Letter of Transfer for Gary Jones to Westminster Presbyterian Church in Eugene, Oregon, was noted, and Dan and Jill Murphy were removed from the Active Member Roll.

Several items from the prior meeting were discussed, including website replacement. Kirsten will work with Dana Stockman to follow up on this with Lynne Stockman and David Harper. No decisions made yet.

Finance: Liability insurance is up for renewal, and there is a need to review building use policies to see whether our forms and agreements need to be updated. A small group including Judy L., Judy M., Paula, and Kirsten will meet on October 28 to discuss and share information.

Paula has prepared a draft budget for 2025 based on prior year expenses, and estimates of future costs. **Personnel:** Draft Terms of Call were prepared and reviewed. Insurance costs have increased by 3%. It was moved, seconded and unanimously agreed to approve a 4% increase in Pastoral compensation as described in the draft Terms of Call.

Finance, Memorial, and Stewardship: Visioning team efforts were discussed. It was agreed that a visioning team should include folks with knowledge of the last visioning process, though not all would be available. Paula and Sharon will work together on starting this process. There may be grant funds available to assist with church improvements suitable for newer building uses.

Pastor's report: Pastor Andy reported that several members/friends who reside at the Bridge were recently left without a ride. He will follow up with adding some of these folks' names to the church directory. Transportation help may be available from some members. Pastor Andy also officiated at the graveside funeral service for Phil Bricker. The Session celebrated the 30th anniversary of Pastor Andy's ordination with him at the Session meeting with a gift of a beautiful fountain pen from the Personnel Committee.

Building Administration shared a building use report. There will be a meeting with Session members and building users on Sunday, October 20 to review building uses, policies, and share information. **Building and Grounds**: Sue's proposal for a "Day of Arakening" for fall clean-up was approved. The date was set for November 3rd via post-meeting email decision. Some new signs will be going up to encourage day use only in the Community Peace Garden. Other seasonal tasks include gutter cleaning will be done. New panic door hardware will be installed at two exits around the church soon.

The Worship and Music Committee met recently. An acknowledgement of All Saints' Day including playing bells to honor members and friends who have passed in the last year will occur on October 27. The Reformation candle will also be lighted on October 27 to acknowledge Reformation Sunday. An Advent Labyrinth workshop led by Pastor Andy will be held on December 14. Other dates approved for coming weeks include church decoration for Advent on December 7 from 10 a.m. – noon. The advent wreath will be removed December 29 after church. Removal of Advent/Christmas decorations (undecorating?) will be scheduled for January 5, 2025, after worship.

The meeting was closed with prayer by Pastor Andy. The next Session meeting will be Wednesday, Nov. 20 at 1:30 p.m.

Autumn Building Uses

How does a church make good use of the building that mostly sits empty on weekdays? The friends and members open it up to affordable meeting space to encourage missional, supportive participation in the community.

On October 20, 2024, FPC hosted a gathering of representatives from most of the groups that meet weekly in various places in the church. Included were Pastor Andy, several elders on session, our faithful custodian, Ken, and about 10 folks who came from the eight regular meeting groups. Around 144 people benefit from affordable meeting space each week at FPC! That ripples out to the community, too.

As we went around the room telling the stories of the individuals and groups, it was heartening to hear about the appreciation and impact of the meeting spaces. Each representative mentioned their willingness to help the church maintain the facilities.

Keeping in mind the importance of meeting spaces for the non-profit sector, there is a committee of elders meeting in November to review the church liability insurance, the building use agreements and the expenses that may be involved as we head into winter.

Other "one-time" groups continue to request space for music rehearsals, concerts, and trainings. One example is the Bonner County Human Rights Task Force that will celebrate Human Rights Day on December 10. More information about upcoming events for the public will be shared as they develop.

Donations (food and money) can also be taken directly to The Food Bank; just remember to give our church credit for them.

In January, both groups will gather for a potluck.
