From the Pastor...

Here we are at the start of a new year. 2025 is a baby! This year is momentous, and January is a busy month of transition. In the United States, we witness a transfer of power following November's election. Dynamics of politics remind us that the definition of community is larger than we'd sometimes like to admit. We often limit ourselves by the way we think. Phrases like, "working with those on both sides of the aisle" in reference to government halls attempt to sound inclusive, but assume a division, a dichotomy that binds us to either/or modes of thought.

As the Sundays after Christmas merge into Epiphany on January 6, the season of Epiphany proclaims God is with us. God is with us. As if God could not be with us. Is this another either/or? Either God is with us, or God is not with us? The next step involves judgment, to say God is with us, but God is not with so and so. If God is not with us, or so and so, then life ceases. Nothing, no-thing can be in existence without God breathing life into it. God's continuous self-offering is what sustains all things, in and through Christ. To see the Christ Presence of God in all things as a great unifier that involves connection rather than separation (uni-fier, as in one) is a gift of the season.

Remember Epiphany? *Epiphaneia* in Greek. *Manifestation. Appearance.* Jesus Christ is revealed to the world (Jew and Gentile) as wise astrologers from the east travel to find a young child in Bethlehem. It is a star that guides them.

Maybe stars can guide us? According to space.com, around 85 percent of stars in our galaxy are binary stars, two or more stars in direct relationship, united by a common center of gravity. These celestial examples show either/ or is actually both/and. Sometimes called double stars, these stars can do things together that single stars cannot. Sometimes there is great distance between them, and others touch and share stellar materials. There's a huge variety in how binary stars interact, but whatever plays out stems from their influence on each other and the commonalities they share.

In a world of uncertainty and tension, we can be living witnesses to the miracle of divinity that permeates life. We can live as an alternative community that emphasizes points of contact and connection over fragmentation and division. This witness begins in our own heart. We're reminded of all this at the conclusion of Epiphany, on Ash Wednesday, when we are told:

Remember you are stardust, and to stardust you shall return.

Two Additional CARES ACT Grants Received:

Last month we reported the receipt of an **Employee Retention Credit** in the form of a grant from the federal pandemic relief program. FPC was eligible to apply for this credit for specific quarters of tax years 2020 and 2021. FPC received checks for two additional quarters in November and December. These grants provided about \$8000 of miscellaneous income in 2024.




Christian Education

She made this banana pudding recipe, from scratch, and each time my son John Whittington comes to visit, I make this. It is very sweet and not "diet" for sure, but we both almost crave it! GRANDMA'S SAUCE for BANANA PUDDING

1-cup sugar

1 T. flour (or can use cornstarch)

1 egg

1-cup milk

1 tsp. vanilla

Microwave this mixture in a glass bowl, on high, in 1-minute increments, stirring after each until thick. It takes me a total of 4 ½ minutes in my microwave.

When made into a sauce, add layers of bananas and vanilla wafers, and chill.

The flavor is better when chilled for several hours.
